B.M.S. World Mission Keeping Families together in Thailand

Monmanat is an 8 year old boy who was born blind and, because of cerebral palsy, is immobile. His mother, Sor, loves her son very much and is dedicated to his treatment, but providing for her family is difficult. The support they receive from the Church of Christ in Thailand Aids Ministry (CAM) and BMS mission worker Judy Cook has helped to keep this family together. "I think it's more beneficial for a child to be with their family, if it's safe than to take them somewhere better equipped, cleaner and has everything but doesn't have mother love," says Judy.

During their monthly visits CAM supports Sor financially while Judy provides nappies, milk, emotional support and foam wedges which prop Monmanat up and give him a chance to develop the muscles in his neck. Judy also helps Sor with exercises that keep the little boy's joints loose and prevent his muscles from weakening or contracting.

Sor and Monmanat have a long and challenging road ahead of them, but thanks to the love and support they receive from Judy and CAM, Sor can continue to care for her son and give him the love that he needs.

Blackpool Schools and Youth Work

Blackpool Schools and Youth Work are an organisation which goes into over 30 Blackpool schools.

Below is taken from their June Prayer Letter and is a report from Scripture Union's Magazine "Connecting You"

"New Guardians of Ancora school clubs are a big hit!"

In January we shared our plans to introduce our new digital game *Guardians of Ancora* into schools, and asked for your support. Through your generosity, your prayers and God's blessing – it's happening!

We are always looking for new ways of sharing Jesus with children and young people. Across the country, our local mission workers are out sharing the gospel with children every day, and are often the first to spot new mission opportunities and develop initiatives to use them, so when we hear about these initiatives, we take them and turn them into something that can be shared with other churches and local mission partners, so that many more children and young people can be blessed.

When we launched our digital game *Guardians of Ancora* Last July, we hoped in particular it would mean that children with no church background could hear the gospel perhaps for the first time. Katy Finney, who works for our local mission partner Blackpool Schools and Youth Work (BSYW) has developed an amazing new way to do this in a schools setting.

Katy already runs lunch and after school clubs for children aged 8-11. When *Guardians of Ancora* was launched she immediately spotted the potential for creating new clubs based on the game. She sounded out some local schools on the idea – seven were interested straight away! Katy worked with one of them to pilot the

first Guardians of Ancora club last October. Since then, six more schools have launched clubs (and there's a waiting list of children keen to join), and a further ten local schools have asked Katy to set up clubs for their children too!

Most Guardian of Ancora schools' clubs run for an hour a week over a term. At the outset, Katy loads the game onto computer tablets (most schools provide these). The children start by playing the same session of Guardian of Ancora. Then Katy runs an interactive session, such as a quiz or discussion, to draw out the scriptural meaning of the games session. Katy says 'I don't need to say much – the children are usually really keen to share their thoughts with each other!'

What's really exciting is that many of the children know little of Christianity and have no church background – but they go on to download and play *Guardian of Ancora* at home in preference to some of the most popular commercial games and Katy knows, from the subsequent discussion sessions, that they are learning lots about Jesus!

Rob Steward, Scripture Union's Schools Worker in the area heard about this success and wondered if it would work elsewhere too. He and Katy shared the Guardians of Ancora school club concept with other local mission partners, and the response was overwhelmingly positive. Well done Katy!

Love Russia - Anna's Story

I was 5 when I was taken to an orphanage because my parents lost custody over me, my brother and two sisters. At first we were put together, but as I began to experience epileptic seizures, I was moved from one orphanage to another since no one knew how to deal with my problem. I ended up in Yelatma orphanage a long way from anywhere else, where most of the children had learning difficulties. We rarely left the building.

Once I was 16 and too old for the orphanage, I made the long bus ride to Ryazan to stay with relatives. I was scared as I didn't know them but didn't stay long; I moved into a college dormitory to train as a seamstress. It was very much like being back at Yelatma. Academic courses were not an option as my literacy skills were very poor. At the end of the course I was no longer entitled to a dormitory bed. I looked for somewhere to live, but nothing worked out. Not quite knowing where I would stay from one night to the next, I was relieved and happy to meet a guy who said he loved me.

We'd not been dating long when I fell pregnant. We moved in with my relatives until the baby was born and after a while he became violent and frightening. By the time I was 20 I couldn't take it anymore and decided to leave. He kept begging me to come home and said he would change. I returned home but left again after realizing he hadn't changed. I went back to my relatives living on £48 a month for me and my baby. I couldn't afford childcare to enable me to work. I found a baby home where I could leave my son until my financial situation improved.

I visited him every day. At two years old he was moved to a nursery class and I was so happy that I could have him back at weekends. However, regular coughs and colds meant I had to take days off work and I lost jobs over and over. My confidence hit zero.

I was introduced to a group where other young mums having also grown up in orphanages were finding help. Amidst all the practical help, group Mentor Galina and other counsellors helped me start believing in my abilities as a mother. They assured me that my baby needed and wanted me, which deep down I knew as I've always longed for my own mother.

More recently I met a man who knows all about my son. He is encouraging me on my journey to have my son live with me full time without any of the pressure and danger I felt from my last boyfriend. He seems keen to get to know us both and take one day at a time. My confidence is beginning to grow.

A Tale of Two Simes

The Queen receives thousands of letter and cards but she has an amazing memory for detail and tremendous care for individual people.

Every year from 1952 Albert Alfred Simes sent a Christmas card from Izmir in Turkey to the reigning monarch until he died in 2011 aged 102. In 1972, he was invited to meet the Queen at a reception in Izmir. His grandson, Andrew, writing on Facebook, recalls the event:

"When it was his turn to be introduced to the Queen, instead of a formal handshake, she paused, smiled and quipped: "So it's you who keeps sending me those lovely Christmas cards."

When his grandfather died in the summer of 2011, Andrew took up the baton and sent a Christmas card to the Queen. The following January, he received a letter from her. Andrew explains:

'In it was written:

"I received a letter from a different Simes this Christmas, I instructed my office to research your grandfather's whereabouts. Therefore, it is with much sadness, I have learned of his passing and extend my condolences to you and your family."

I couldn't fight back the tears then, nor can I fight them back every time I remember this story of two people who left a lifelong impression on each other.'

Summer in Bavaria

For the fourth time in the last five years, I was privileged enough to spend a week in Ingolstadt, Bavaria, at the start of July. The opportunity arises because Ingolstadt is the home of Saint Aidan's partner school, Christoph Scheiner Gymnasium. Our two schools have been linked for almost 25 years and the exchange visits between our respective students have been going on for 20 years. The German students came to visit the Fylde Coast in March and enjoyed days in our school, as well as trips to Lancaster, Chester, the Pleasure Beach and bowling at Thornton YMCA. It was great for them to experience English culture at first hand.

Our return, always at the end of June, saw 20 of our students go to live with families in Bavaria, Southern Germany. As you would expect, the weather was very hot and the week was enhanced by the live showings of the European Football Championships on every corner! The students I accompanied were able to visit the Nazi Party Rally Grounds in Nuremburg as well as tour the city and its castle. The visit also took in Munich and the famous Englischer Garten park and the stunning shops in and around Marienplatz. Chantelle, Tory and I were also lucky enough to visit Chiemsee lake by the Austrian border and take in the pretty walled town of Ingolstadt itself and its immense Dom (Minster). Ingolstadt is a very affluent town (it is the German headquarters of Audi) with lots of lovely bars and restaurants.

It was a joy to take our students over there and enjoy German culture for a week. Teaching is not an easy profession, but there are one or two perks. I certainly feel privileged to have experienced the education systems and taught lessons, in China, Russia, France, South Africa and Germany over the years. I do hope that we'll still be welcome in them all after Brexit!
